

Pastor's Prose: God is With Me Always

As I am writing this article, I am preparing for the trip of a lifetime. I leave September 12th to go on a private jet around the world. It is not really around the world, but that is the way it was advertised by Road Scholar. We will visit

Stonehenge in England, the pyramids and Sphinx in Egypt, Petra in Jordan, the Taj Mahal in India, Angkor Wat in Cambodia, a Buddhist Temple in Indonesia, and a Muslim Mosque in Oman. All of this in 21 days. The only place I have been before is Stonehenge. So, I am excited to see so many new sites. And I realized after describing the trip several times, that all these places have some religious themes.

This is not my first major trip nor will it be my last. I have been to six continents so I plan to visit Australia to check off all seven continents. There are many places left to visit on all the continents. My bucket list is long, and I look forward to checking off many places on my bucket list.

Ever since I was a child, I have loved to travel. I remember studying the states of this country in school and set a goal to visit all the states of the United States. I accomplished that. Alaska was my last and I visited Alaska in 2012.

I visited a number of states a year after I graduated from college. A friend and I traveled by car from Florida where I was living across the southern states, all the way to California, up



to San Francisco and back across the country. I learned on that trip that I enjoyed traveling by car. We had an overall plan, but no details of a specific

place on a certain date. We didn't make reservations and took detours when we saw something that might be interesting. There have been other cross country trips, but in the interest of one article I will reserve those stories for another time.

Two life-changing international trips were an African Safari and a trip to Antarctica. The trip to Zimbabwe, South Africa, Botswana, Namibia, and Zambia was memorable because of all the animals I saw. One of the places we stayed was surrounded by animals. A staff member had to escort you to your room after dusk. One of my closest encounters was with an elephant. I was ready to walk up the stairs to where the jeeps were parked for a drive searching for the animals, and a staff member stopped me to let the elephant walk by on the sidewalk about three feet away.

My trip to Antarctica was amazing because of the scenery and because of the animals. We saw thousands of penguins, birds, whales, and walruses. We had experts on the ship with us who gave lectures. Two of the experts were penguin counters. By their count we saw approximately 32,000 penguins. We also got to launch a weather balloon.



I love to travel for several reasons. I am always excited to see new sights and sites. I try to plant the beauty of each location in my memory. God's creation is amazing. I also love to travel to meet new people and hear their stories and to begin to understand the culture of a particular location.

I traveled to Mexico to build houses. I learned that the American companies who were there would hire 12- and 13-year-olds to work in factories. The labor was very cheap. And the young boys and girls went to work because their families needed the money. The long-term effect was the boy and girls didn't finish their education and so could never have a better job. The benefit was to American companies in the short run and the disadvantage was to Mexico in the long run.

When I went to Mozambique in Africa, we stayed in the village of Chicuque. There was no electricity to all the houses. Each morning the staff put on a huge pot of water to heat for our showers. A pick-up truck with a loud speaker on top went through the village to announce where polio vaccines would be given. Everyone we met had either had malaria or someone in their family had had malaria. One of the leading causes of death for young girls dying in childbirth was the cultural norm to have a baby as soon as possible because men wanted to marry girls and women who could prove they were fertile.

I find that some of my values get challenged by my trips. When I went to Nepal, the definition of spirituality came into question. As a Christian I thought we needed to set aside one day a day to focus on God. In Nepal, the majority of the people were Hindu. They don't set aside one day a week. Instead, they stop by the many shrines along roads and pray at each shrine. The spirituality was very different than mine, but neither is less relevant and significant to the other.

There are so many other stories and I imagine that many of you have stories about trips you have taken. I constantly remember three things no matter where I go. Everywhere I go is part of God's wonderful creation. God is present long before I arrive (whether there are Christians there or not). And God is with me always, everywhere, and in everything I do.

Finance Update

Finance Team agrees to cover unbudgeted activities

The Finance Team met on August 15. As of the end of July, our finances remain in good shape. We are blessed that MHUMC's year-to-date income is slightly more than our budget target, thanks to our faithful and generous church community. This gives us confidence that we can meet unbudgeted expenses without worry. While the Capital Campaign is key to completing the repainting of the church, we are drawing on some reserves that have built up in the General Fund and our Parsonage account to meet some unexpected necessary maintenance that came to light in the course of the painting.



The Finance Team also committed to reimbursing some expenses that have been shouldered by individual members. Supplies that we must provide for Sharing the Bounty will now be covered up to about \$200 per month through the end of 2025. We are fortunate to have Nancy Domnauer shepherding that program, and are grateful for the work that Matthew Hendrickson has done to arrange for buying these supplies in bulk at lower cost.

Additionally, in order to have lovely flowers each week for our worship service, the Church will now reimburse floral expenses of up to \$40 per week through the end of 2025. Janet Tuttle will bring a signup list so all can choose a date or dates to bring a floral arrangement in honor of a loved one, on a special day, or simply as the Spirit moves. Look for the signup soon, and remember to turn in your receipts.

The information we will gain from covering these new expense categories will, we hope, help us add a realistic budget for each in 2026.

Church Endowment keeps growing

Since its establishment in August of 2023 with an initial deposit of just over \$13,000, our very young Endowment Fund has grown well. Through the two years that the Endowment has been managed by the California-Nevada United Methodist Foundation, we have added nearly \$20,000 to the original sum. This is due both to additional contributions and to investment gains. The Endowment Committee will meet early this fall to decide whether we can make small grants from the interest earned, as we did last year, for the benefit of the Church and the community.


